

"Amos was God's prophet to prosperous Israel, steeped in religiosity, immorality, and complacency. Amos was one of the most colorful personalities among the prophets. He was humble and rugged, a son of the wilderness, like Elijah and John the Baptist. One writer says that his was 'one of the most wonderful appearances in the history of the human spirit." (Jensen, *Jensen's Survey of the Old Testament*, pp. 403-404)

B.L.U.F. (bottom line up front): God is serious, we need to listen.

1. What Upsets God? 1:1-2:16

Eight "burdens" are on Amos' (and God's) heart. Each is prefaced by the formula "for 3 transgressions and for 4." This is not arithmetic but "you have stepped one step too far!"

"for 3 transgressions and for 4" 1st time God rebukes 2nd time God threatens 3rd time God lifts His hand 4th time God smites!

Cruelties against others is the sin

judged (except Judah & Israel)

• Syria (Damascus – Syria's capital city) 1:3-5

Atrocity - cruelty in war. Tearing & mangling bodies with iron instruments.

- Philistia (Gaza Philistia's fortress city) 1:6-8
- Atrocity slavery of a whole region
- Phoenicia (Tyre) 1:9-10 Atrocity slavery of a whole region
- Edom 1:11-12 Atrocity constant hatred of Judah
- Ammon 1:13-15 Atrocity extermination for expansion
- Moab 2:1-3 Atrocity cruel revenge
- Judah 2:4-5 Sin rejecting God's law

• Israel 2:6-16 Sins – bribery, greed, adultery, selfishness, ingratitude, drunkenness

2. What Do We Need to Understand? 3:1-6:14

Israel is enjoying a time of peace, prosperity & religious revival. People were attending services and bringing offerings. But God saw their hearts.

- 1) Message of Explanation 3:1-15 "Therefore..." v. 11 Privilege brings responsibility. Cause & effect.
- 2) Message of Accusation 4:1-13 "Therefore..." v. 12
- Message of Lamentation 5:1-6:14 "Therefore..." v. 16 Amos weeps over the sin that will bring judgment.

3. What is Coming? 7:1-9:15

The future doesn't look good. There are lots of problems coming. But the end is optimistic!

much to teach us. They both ministered in the reign of Jeroboam II, but they dealt with the situation in different ways. God chooses men to present different aspects of truth to the same people, and these varying emphases are not contradictory but complementary. Amos is a preacher of righteousness, but Hosea, of mercy. Amos embraces heathen nations in his survey, but Hosea never goes beyond Israel and Judah. What Amos has in width, Hosea has in depth. Amos sees the nation purified by judgment, but Hosea sees it surviving judgment by repentance. The emphasis of Amos is on the justice of God, but the emphasis of Hosea is on His love. Amos is very stern, but Hosea is very tender. Amos preaches God's sovereignty, but Hosea proclaims His salvation. – Scroogie, quoted in Phillips, *Exploring Minor Prophets*, p. 88-89
